<b>Content:</b> What will students know	The mythological foundations of Rome, including the stories of Aeneas and Romulus and Remus. <b>Skills:</b> What will students be able to do	Use a range of evidence from the OCR prescribed written sources and key archaeological remains to gain an understanding of the key foundation myths of Rome and their importance to the Roman people. Form critical opinions on the reliability and usefulness of our sources and consider the extent to which they demonstrate that the actual foundations of Rome must have been very different to how they are presented in mythology. They will also consider the importance of mythology to a civilisation and why they would make it part of their cultural history.	Use a range of evidence from the OCR prescribed written sources and key archaeological remains to assess the impact of each of the Seven kings and form an opinion on which one had the greatest impact on Rome. Summarise the key political, social, legal, military and religious contributions of each king and make critical judgements as to who made the greatest contribution to the development of Rome. Explore the nature and reliability of the different sources available and form an opinion on how reliable our account of each king can be considered to be. Through analytical study of the primary material form opinions on why monarchy failed in Rome and also consider the advantages and disadvantages of the Republican system that followed.	Use a range of evidence from the OCR prescribed written sources and key archaeological remains to gain an understanding of the significant events and key influences in the childhood and upbringing of Cleopatra. Students will form critical opinions on who/what had the greatest influence on Cleopatra and how each influence shaped her into the woman she became. Students will also consider the problematic nature of the sources all being male Romans and how this affects the way in which they have presented Cleopatra in their historical writing.	Use a range of evidence from the OCR prescribed written sources and key archaeological remains to gain an understanding of the significant events of Cleopatra's reign and form critically judgments of her as a leader. Explore the problematic nature of our Roman sources in how they present the reign of Cleopatra and her relationship with Mark Anthony and Julius Caesar. Understand the key events and tactics of the battle of Actium and why Mark Anthony and Cleopatra failed to defeat Octavian and what this meant for each of them politically. Explore the story of the death of Cleopatra and consider why she was forced to end her life in this way.	Improve their knowledge of the key content and their examination skills.
